Flying for Life in PNG

MAF's Vision: is that isolated people will be physically and spiritually transformed in Christ's name



"The only way we can get in and out of Amdu is by plane. Without that support none of what we are doing would be possible."

This comment was made by a New Tribes missionary as he said thank-you to MAF for assisting in their ministry to one of the most remote tribes in Papua New Guinea. NTM is a ministry that specifically targets people who are the least likely to hear the gospel and then makes great effort to help that to happen. With the Amdu people group located on the far western border of PNG, consisting of villages scattered in the mountains ranging from 3500ft to 7000ft, they are ranked very high on the needs scale. As three NTM families prepare to move into isolation they ask MAF for assistance. NTM also has an aviation division, but not unlike MAF, they are also being affected by pilot shortages and do not have the resources at this time to serve an area located so far from their other bases.

So as MAF flies in supplies and building materials, and houses start to appear in the jungle, the small statured people of Amdu are becoming more excited.

Bringing the Good News is not a quick fix it takes years of dedication and perseverance. The missionaries must first learn the local tribal language and culture so they can translate the scriptures into the people's heart language, a process that can take between three to five years. That is only the start, there will be many more years of work as translation work follows along with literacy training and discipleship as a baby church is planted.

Philip Sutter, an MAF pilot comments, "I can see how our airplanes are used so that isolated people are being transformed in Christ's name."
