Flying for life in PNG MARSH'S JOURNEY

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THERE WAS AN EXCITED CROWD CHEERING THE FIRST TIME MAF TOUCHED DOWN IN AIBAI

After 14 years of perseverance and cooperation among the tribes living close to Aibai, the airstrip was opened for operation!

Jason was able to fly in to do a test landing on August 15th, doing a survey to check that the remote strip would be workable for the planes coming in. As part of that initial landing he first had to fly over for a visual inspection, and once on the ground had to determine whether the length, width, slope and surface were suitable and up to the standard that MAF maintains. Everything looked good. Even though there is a 12% slope, everything checked out.

Michael and Janice Berbin and their three boys first arrived in Aibai back in 1997 and after 17 years of service among the Solue people the opened airstrip will be a blessing in helping them to receive the supplies necessary while running a Christian school and a health clinic. Previous to having the plane as a resource their only other option for transportation was helicopter, which is much more expensive, or the roads which are treacherous to travel because of the lack of maintenance, hold ups, and unreliability of whether it would even be open or not due to landslides.

It is a privilege to serve people who have such dedication and to be able to assist them in their ministry.

DISASTER RELIEF

When it rains it pours! The people in the community of Wabo were certainly feeling the effects of that statement in July when they received so much rain that the river the community is built on overflowed its banks and washed the low lying portion of the village away. It is fortunate that while the airstrip was threatened, it is built up a bit



higher and was not badly damaged making it possible for the planes to still be able to get in, bringing relief supplies and also enabling the people to put up temporary shelters. Among the supplies taken in were water containers, giving the people a way of storing good drinking water as waterborne diseases such as typhoid are always a risk.

MEASLES!

There is currently a measles outbreak in PNG with hospitals in the major centers being inundated with people who are suffering from the disease. It is also sad to say there have been several deaths from this childhood disease that we are all vaccinated for and do not consider a threat. There is currently a big vaccination push around the country to try and get as many people the vaccine as possible and MAF has been carrying vaccines into remote communities so that they too will have some protection against the disease. Just a few weeks back, following our Sunday church service, some nurses were at the church giving vaccinations to anyone who was interested.

Definitely a new venue.

It has been a good year for honey this year in PNG and we here in Goroka are blessed to have a connection with EBC (Evangelical Brotherhood Church), established by a Swiss mission, who have a gentleman here right now who is an excellent bee keeper! Enough brand new bee boxes to fill the otter and enough bees to start a colony for each! They were headed to a village in the coastal mountains called Kabwoom. The people in that community were interested in beginning to cultivate bees so were very excited when all of the equipment that they needed to start their new project arrived!
